





# Mott Haven-Port Morris Community Land Stewards

- Established in 2015 by South Bronx residents as a Community Land Trust
- Maintains land permanently for public use and community selfdetermination
- Advances cultural, social, and economic initiatives—including affordable housing and pathways to homeownership
- South Bronx Unite, a project of the Land Stewards, leads community organizing and planning initiatives including the Mott Haven-Port Morris Waterfront Plan and a Clean Air Program featuring local air quality monitoring





## History of the Lincoln Recovery Center

- 1931: Mott Haven Health Center opens
- 1970-1978:
  - Black Panther Party and Young Lords protest healthcare inequities at Lincoln Hospital
  - Lincoln Detox Center and People's Drug Program established on-site
  - First major use of acupuncture for addiction treatment in the U.S.
- 1980s-2010s:
  - Continued use of acupuncture and alternative treatments
  - Nationally recognized as a symbol of grassroots healthcare activism
- 2013: Building closed and vacated








#### Project Summary

- **Proposed ground lease with H+H** for \$42MM rehabilitation and 2,300 sq. ft. expansion of the 22,750 sq. ft. former Lincoln Recovery Center into the HEArts Center
- Vacant since 2013; extensive structural damage, flood and mold remediation required
- Adaptive reuse to deliver Health & Wellness, Education, and Arts & Culture programming
- Includes shared community spaces, performance / rehearsal areas, and offices for local nonprofit organizations
- Construction anticipated to begin in early 2026; completion expected in late 2027































### Community-Led Vision

- 2013: Community begins advocating for reuse of the property
- 2015: MHPMCLS formed to acquire and repurpose the site
- 2016: South Bronx Unite partners with CUNY Architecture for visioning events
- 2018: HEArts Feasibility Report completed, strengthening advocacy to repurpose the building for community use
- 2018-2022: Annual HEArts Festivals held in front of the building to celebrate and strengthen the community's vision








### Community Feedback

- Healthcare disparities in Mott Haven and Port Morris reflect limited access to health care and years of environmental injustice
- Education outcomes remain deeply inequitable, with overcrowded schools and high dropout rates, leaving few pathways to stable jobs
- Arts and culture thrive locally, but there are almost no accessible spaces for youth and artists to create, learn, and perform
- Community groups face displacement, even as demand for their services grows. Affordable space is essential to keep them rooted








### City RFP Process

- 2022: NYCEDC & NYC Health + Hospitals issued an RFP to redevelop the former Lincoln Recovery Center
- 2023: HEArts Collaborative: MHPMCLS & Alembic selected as conditional developer
- 2023-2025: Development team advancing design, due diligence, and predevelopment work
- 2025-2027: Ground lease execution, financial closing, and construction







#### Programmatic Pillars of the HEArts Center

#### Health and Wellness


- Holistic and community-rooted health and wellness through cooking demos, exercise classes, health screenings, and Tai Chi
- Free services by certified practitioners, including training opportunities
- Nutrition, movement, holistic wellness

#### Education

- Expanding access for youth and adults, targeting systemic inequities
- Workforce training in food, STEM, and green energy sectors
- Led by partners including Green City Force

#### Arts and Culture

- Arts centered on local culture are integrated across all programs
- Offerings include music, dance, theater, visual arts, film and design
- Programming and performances by UpBeat NYC and H+H Arts in Medicine





### Programming Partners










- Green City Force: Training 225 NYCHA youth annually for green jobs
- UpBeat NYC: Serving 150 youth and hosting 30-40 public performances each year
- Mott Haven-Port Morris Community Land Stewards / South Bronx Unite: Coleading health and wellness programs, organizing, and community advocacy





### Alembic Community Development

- Founded in 2004 in NYC to partner with nonprofit organizations to develop affordable housing and community facilities in underserved communities
- Completed a range of adaptive reuse projects of historic buildings into community facilities utilizing New Markets and Historic Tax Credits
- Developed properties totaling more than 2,500 affordable and supportive housing units; 300,000 square feet of commercial and community facility space; and \$1.2 billion of development costs





#### **HEArts Center Impacts**

- Remediation of long-blighted property with long-term control and operations by community-led organization
- Permanent, affordable space secured for local community-based organizations to grow and serve
- 80+ full-time, living wage jobs created or relocated, with a focus on local hiring and comprehensive benefits
- 4,000 residents served annually through accessible, preventative health and wellness services
- 225 youth and young adults engaged each year in workforce training and career development programs
- 300+ annual participants in arts education programs and 7,000+ visitors to community
  events and performances
