Each year, we celebrate the dedication, compassion, and professionalism of more than 9,600 nurses who serve 1.4 million New Yorkers across our network of more than 70 care sites citywide, including: 11 essential hospitals, five post-acute care centers, Correctional Health Services, Gotham Health community centers, and Community Care. The Nursing Excellence Awards honor the best of our profession; nurses who embody our mission to keep patients first while striving for excellence in clinical practice, education, leadership, and service. This celebration offers an opportunity to recognize the extraordinary contributions of our nurses, whose expertise and compassion make a profound difference every day.

Each year, our nursing leadership faces the challenging task of selecting honorees from among the many deserving and highly qualified nominees.

This year, the process was even more difficult as we received an impressive 524 nominations, reflecting the remarkable depth of talent and passion that define nursing across our system.

We are especially proud to celebrate a historic milestone: NYC Health + Hospitals/Metropolitan and NYC Health + Hospitals/Carter have each achieved Pathway to Excellence with Distinction which are the first and second designations of their kind in the nation. These honors affirm our leadership in fostering workplaces where nurses are supported, engaged, and recognized as vital partners in care and organizational success.

We also continue to celebrate the achievements of our facilities through the Structural Empowerment Award, now in its sixth year. This award recognizes a facility that demonstrates a sustained commitment to professional growth, certification, and infrastructure development supporting nursing excellence. This year's honoree, NYC Health + Hospitals/Metropolitan, is recognized for fostering an environment that encourages empowerment and continuous improvement.

We have selected 35 individual honorees, representing each of our facilities and clinical services including acute care, post-acute care, Correctional Health, Gotham Health, and Community Care each demonstrating excellence in a specific area. 25 nurses are receiving Excellence in Clinical Nursing Awards, and five nurses are being recognized with system-level awards: Excellence in Education and Mentorship; Excellence in Home, Community, or Ambulatory Care; Excellence in Nursing Leadership; Excellence in Technology and Innovation; and Excellence in Volunteerism and Service.

NYC Health + Hospitals was the first health system to present the DAISY Award for Nurses Advancing Health Equity and we remain deeply proud to honor nurses whose work advances health equity and helps eliminate health disparities rooted in social determinants of health.

This is a special moment to celebrate Nursing Excellence at NYC Health + Hospitals.

We are experiencing something of a renaissance as more and more nurses are seeking to work here, and stay here.

This year we announced a major milestone: our nurse turnover rate has hit a historic low of just 7.3%. That's well below the national average of 16.4%. This marks a dramatic turnaround from 2019, when nearly half of all nurses left their positions, driving the turnover rate to 46%.

In addition, we hired 3,417 nurses in 2024, replacing many temporary nurses. More nurses who want to stay means our patients are served by permanent employees who are committed to our mission.

Our dedicated Chief Nursing Executive, Natalia Cineas is implementing myriad programs designed to support nursing professional development and staff engagement, and these initiatives are driving visible and consequential improvements in all facets of nursing.

We have several new fellowship opportunities in nursing education and emergency medicine, our Nurse Residency program is thriving, our clinical ladder program, now in its 5th year has seen participation double. And we just celebrated our 3rd annual Nursing Doctoral Circle of Excellence, to honor those nurses who have achieved the highest academic degrees in their fields.

Amid this growth, and these wonderful programs and opportunities, it comes as no surprise to me, that we are simultaneously seeing levels of nursing excellence that changing our culture, and bringing in awards, honors and recognition.

But as we all know, behind every award and achievement, are individuals. People who have chosen to give their all every day to make our patient care the best it can be. It is these individuals, and the excellence they shine forth, that we are here to celebrate today.

Ena Williams, PhD, MBA, RN, CNEP, FAAN, FADLN KEYNOTE SPEAKER & 2025 JOSEPHINE BOLUS NURSING CHAMPION



Ena Williams, PhD, MBA, RN, CENP, FAAN, FADLN Senior Vice President / Chief Nursing Executive Yale New Haven Health

Ena currently serves as the Senior Vice President and Chief Nursing Executive at Yale New Haven Health. Most recently she served as the SVP/Chief Nursing Officer at Yale New Haven Hospital (YNHH), a 1541-bed three-time ANCC Magnet ® designated, level I trauma academic medical center. She is the very 1st African American CNE & CNO appointed at YNHHS and YNHH.

Ena began her career in Jamaica after graduating from the University Hospital of the West Indies. She migrated to the United States and in 1991 was employed as a staff nurse at Bronx Lebanon Hospital in New York. In 1992 she joined the staff at Yale New Haven as a staff nurse in the operating room and quickly progressed through several leadership positions: Laser Coordinator, Perioperative Educator, Patient Services Manager, Nursing Director, VP, and Associate Chief Nursing Officer for Patient Services. Ena assumed the role of chief nursing officer in 2018 and led the nursing team to their first ANCC Nurse Residency PTAP Accreditation in the state of Connecticut and the third ANCC Magnet ® designation in 2021.

During her tenure, Ena has led expansion and design of state-of-the-art operating rooms, oversaw the first DaVinci robotic surgical program implementation and, the first 3T MRI and Interventional ORs in the state of CT, and the integration of nursing across a newly acquired hospital. The hospital and teams have been recognized with several BEACON, Lantern, PRISM, an ANCC national nurse of the year (2022), and most recently, YNHH was awarded the 2024 ANCC Magnet Prize, sponsored by Press Ganey, for the development of a patient experience survey tool for psychiatric inpatients. Under her leadership, she partnered with development to increase philanthropy funds by more than \$1M and a special fund for Support Care Associates who are in the progress of attending nursing school, professional development and recognition. Funds also support the first High School Summer Immersion program in partnership with an academic partner to introduce high school students to health care careers. Her leadership has resulted in improvements in nursing quality, patient experience, and creating a strong nursing practice environment supported by a Nursing Professional Governance Structure.

Ena serves numerous local, state, national boards, and committees, and is active in her community. Ena is a lifetime member of the National Black Nurses Association, a member of the Organization of Nurse Leaders (New England). Ena also serves on the University of Connecticut School of Nursing (UCON) DEIB Committee. She is an active member of her church community.

Ena has been recognized with numerous awards. The Mary B. Conceison Award for Excellence in Nursing Leadership from the Organization Of Nurse Leaders – New England (2025), named one of 50 Most Influential Clinical Executives by Modern Healthcare (2024); Albertus Magnus College Alumni of the Year Award in honor of her outstanding professional contributions and achievements (2024); the Dorsey Kendrick Community Service Award from the CT State Community College – Gateway (2024); Community Leadership Award from ConnCAT (2022), the Hometown Hero Award from the Gateway Community College in New Haven (2020), Leadership Award, The North American National Nigerian Nurses Association (2018), the Legendary Women Award (2018),the Trailblazer award from the National Black Nurses Association (2017), the Cornell Scott Health Leadership Award from the NAACP of greater New Haven (2015). She is a published author of nursing book chapters, journal articles and a frequent speaker at local, state, and national conferences.

Ena graduated from the University Hospital of the West Indies with a Diploma in Nursing, Western Governors University (BSN), Albertus Magnus College (MSM/MBA), and a PhD in Management and Leadership from Walden University. Ena is a graduate of the Johnson and Johnson Innovation Nurse Fellowship, the GE Health Management Nurse Executive Fellowship and is Board certified in Executive Nursing Practice from the American Organization of Nursing Leadership. She is also a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing (2023). Ena was named as one of the Inaugural Fellows of the Academy of Diversity Leaders in Nursing by the National Black Nurses Association (2024).

"My deep compassion, resilience, and genuine desire to make even the smallest difference in someone's hardest day."

Ana's inspiration to become a nurse began at home. "My mother, the most selfless and compassionate person I know, showed me that true purpose in life comes from helping people, from being the light in someone's darkest moment," she shares.

Nursing, for her, was never just a profession; it was a calling. "To me, being a nurse isn't just what I do;it's who I am."

Among NYC Health + Hospitals' ICARE values, Excellence most closely defines her philosophy. "Excellence means never settling for 'good enough' when a life,no matter how tiny,is in my hands," she says. Each shift, she strives to rise above fatigue and uncertainty, delivering care that is "safe, compassionate, and trustworthy."

Integrating the new "ICARE with Kindness" initiative, Ana turns kindness into clinical practice. "Kindness becomes safety and dignity," she explains. Whether celebrating a milestone or holding space for grief, she ensures every family feels supported and seen.

Looking toward the future, Ana sees nursing evolving alongside technology while remaining grounded in compassion. "The world will need nurses who can bridge both data and devices intelligently while never losing sight of the person behind the diagnosis." She plans to continue growing through education and leadership, ensuring that empathy remains at the heart of progress.

With 20 years of nursing experience and 19 of them with NYC Health + Hospitals, Cheryl-Ann D. Blondell, BSN, RN is known for her kindness, empathy, and steady leadership. She believes that great nursing combines skill with humanity, and she strives to bring those values into every interaction. "I try to be approachable and supportive," she says. "Whether it's my patients or my colleagues, I'm always ready to help, to listen, and to get my hands dirty when needed."

Cheryl's passion for nursing traces back to childhood. Inspired by her mother, who dreamed of Head Nurse, Long Term Care becoming a nurse but never had the opportunity, she set her sights on the profession early on.

"When I was little and people asked what I wanted to be when I grew up, I always said 'a nurse," she recalls.

That dream became a reality when she moved to the United States to pursue nursing. "This profession gave me the chance not only to fulfill my own dream but also to help people in some of the most vulnerable moments of their lives."

Cheryl's approach to patient care is deeply collaborative and centered on respect. She ensures patients and families have a voice in every decision and advocates fiercely for those who can't speak for themselves. "I want families to know that their loved one is being cared for with heart ,not as a task, but as a person," she explains. "Care should always be compassionate, humane, and meaningful."

Among the ICARE values, integrity stands out as the cornerstone of her character," she notes. "It's about doing the right thing even when no one is watching."

She integrates the "ICARE with Kindness" initiative through small, intentional acts of appreciation. "One of my nurses once asked why I say 'thank you' so often," she shares. "I told her it's because people need to feel seen and valued. It takes a team to do this work, and kindness holds that team together."

Looking ahead, Cheryl-Ann envisions technology, especially artificial intelligence, becoming a greater part of healthcare. Still, she believes education and empathy will remain essential. "Al can help us improve outcomes," she says, "but we must use it to strengthen, not replace, the human side of nursing. I plan to keep learning, adapting, and using new tools to support better, more preventative care."

With 25 years of service at NYC Health + Hospitals, Milana Leviyev, BSN, RN has built a career defined by compassion, patience, and deep human connection. She is known for her calm presence, her ability to communicate clearly, and her unwavering commitment to person-centered care. "I genuinely care about our residents and take the time to listen to their concerns, which helps build trust and comfort," she says. Her empathy ensures that every patient is treated as an individual and that compassion often makes a lasting difference in their well-being.

Influenced by several family members who were nurses, she always knew that this was her calling. "I always wanted to be a nurse," she reflects. "This profession is so rewarding because you're able to help those in need. I'm proud that I was able to achieve my dream." Over the years, her work with residents living with dementia has become both her passion and her purpose. She finds profound meaning in small but powerful moments of connection, like when a patient who rarely spoke suddenly began singing along to a familiar song. "For a few minutes, she was fully present; smiling, tapping her hands, and making eye contact. It reminded me how powerful small, person-centered interventions can be."

She plans to stay proactive through continued education in gerontology and dementia care while mentoring newer nurses to uphold the same compassionate standards that define the profession. "I promised myself I would support those who suffer in silence and advocate for those too afraid to seek help."

Edner's advocacy extends beyond individual patients as he views nursing as a key driver in advancing health equity. "Nurses can be powerful advocates at every level," he says. "We help break down barriers caused by social and economic inequities. In psychiatry, especially, trust and understanding are everything."

Mitigating health disparities is central to his mission. Edner believes that nurses must not only deliver care but also educate and empower patients to make healthier lifestyle choices. "Promoting good nutrition, exercise, and mental well-being is as important as treating illness," he affirms.

Among the ICARE values, he finds the greatest resonance with Compassion and Integrity, the cornerstones of his holistic and advocacy-driven philosophy.

Edner recounts a moment when a patient arrived early, agitated and impatient about being seen immediately. We must address health disparities and take a holistic approach to meet the needs of all patients, regardless of their background," she concludes. Liyun describes herself as a nurse who treats every patient and family member with patience and understanding. She has also seamlessly integrated the "ICARE with Kindness" initiative into her work. One example she shares is her approach to caring for patients with depression. "If possible, I sit and talk to them for a few minutes every day," she says. "It helps them feel that they are not alone and that makes a big difference."

Looking ahead, Liyun sees nursing as an ever-evolving profession that must adapt to rapid advancements in science and technology. "Nursing is one of the most important professions in the world," she says. "To meet the needs of modern society, I have to keep learning new skills and improving myself." JOSEPHINE BOLUS: A LASTING LEGACY



JOSEPHINE BOLUS, MS, RN, CNP, APRN-BC

Josephine Bolus was a true standard-bearer for nurses and the nursing profession: As the first recipient of the Nursing Champion Award in 2013, Josephine was recognized for her tireless support of NYC Health + Hospitals nursing, including her efforts to address challenges facing the profession.

As the first nurse chosen to serve on the NYC Health + Hospitals Board of Directors, Mrs. Bolus was instrumental in advocating for patients and nurses; challenging nurses to be active both professionally and politically; and insisting upon using quality resources to deliver exceptional patient care.

The 2019 passing of Josephine Bolus was a tragedy felt not only by her family, friends and colleagues, but by the full NYC Health + Hospitals system as well as the entire nursing community.

Josephine Bolus left an indelible mark upon our system and the nursing profession. Mrs. Bolus began her nursing career in 1971, receiving an AAS degree in Nursing from New York City Community College.

She served the Kings County Hospital Center patient community as a Staff Nurse in the Pediatric Emergency Room. In 1975, Mrs. Bolus completed the Kings County Hospital/State University of Health Science Center Pediatric Nurse Practitioner Program and thereafter served as a certified Pediatric Nurse Practitioner until her retirement in 1997. In addition to her AAS, Mrs. Bolus also earned a Bachelors of Health Science from Brooklyn College and Master of Science in Administration from Central Michigan University.

As a strong proponent of the recognition of the vital role of nurses and their contribution to the delivery of health care, Mrs. Bolus pioneered the establishment of certification guidelines for the nurse practitioner in New York State. She also served as Preceptor for Pediatric Nurse Practitioner students at Columbia University and for Registered Nursing students at Kingsborough Community College.

Following her retirement, Mrs. Bolus remained an active advocate for the nursing profession, founding the Retired RN Network; serving as Second Vice Chairperson of the Community Advisory Board at the Dr. Susan Smith McKinney Nursing and Rehabilitation Center; a New York State Nurses Association member; NYS House of Delegates, American Nurses Association member; Brooklyn College Alumni Board member; President of Brooklyn's Canarsie Lions; NYPD 69th Precinct Community Council Member; usher and past president, of the Rosary Society of St. Jude's Church; and president of the Brooklyn Canarsie Memorial Day Parade.

Mrs. Bolus was appointed to the NYC Health + Hospitals Board of Directors on March 15, 2004 as the City Council designee for Brooklyn and served on numerous Board Committees, including Audit, Capital, Executive, Equal Employment Opportunity,

Quality Assurance, Medical & Professional Affairs, Information Technology, as well as Community Relations, which she chaired. It is therefore extremely fitting that we rename the Nursing Champion Award in her honor, and place the plaque with the names of nurses who demonstrate a commitment to nursing excellence in our Board Room at NYC Health + Hospitals as a permanent reminder of our dedication to quality.

NYC Health + Hospitals' prestigious "Nursing Champion Award" was renamed in 2020 as the "Josephine Bolus Nursing Champion Award," in honor of the very first recipient of the Nursing Champion Award in 2013, former NYC Health + Hospitals Board Member Josephine Bolus.

The renamed Josephine Bolus Nursing Champion Award is an annual honor that is bestowed upon a person or organization demonstrating substantial and sustained support for nurses and the nursing profession.
